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EAVING their cultures and creativity into a magnificent medley, two Bahrain-loving artists, reunited more than 10,000 kilometres from where they first met, to work together on a masterpiece of a music video, set to be released tomorrow.

Originally recorded by former Bahrain resident Ashwin 'Xenai' Shenoy and released last year, Ghost has garnered more than 37,500 streams and is set to get its own music video, courtesy of award-winning Bahraini filmmaker Deena AlSaweer (Instagram: deenafilm).

"I heard Ghost and immediately it inspired visuals and my imagination ran wild," Deena told GulfWeekly.

She reached out to Xenai, saying that she would love to film a music video for the song, and they immediately began discussing visuals and scenes to convey the deeper meanings within the song. "The world is going

through a shift in consciousness and more people than ever before are becoming aware of not only what's happening around the world, but also what is happening within themselves," Xenai explained.

"A lot of my songs are about my journey of selfdiscovery, enlightenment and alienation which is why I think this song resonates with people.

"It talks of having a spiritual experience in the most mundane of places, and the disappearance of ego (becoming a ghost).

"Beyond the lyrics, even the way I produced it is unique, embracing both r Indian heritage, sampling the Hindustani Classical instrument Sarangi, and my Arab influence from childhood, playing the Oud."

Originally written within a week in 2022, the song languished in Xenai's creative vault for a year, before Grammy Award-winning engineer

Kaushlesh "Garry" Purohit mixed and mastered it and it was finally released on November 17, 2023. Since the day it was released, Deena had a feeling it would be a hit, and as the months crawled by and the streams rolled in, there was only one thing standing in the way of the music video

finally being made: distance. "I was in Ottawa and he was in California," she explained.

Undeterred, the two planned and brainstormed, not knowing when they might be able to make it a reality, until Xenai was able to take a detour during a trip to visit his brother in

Toronto, and ride the train to Ottawa.

"I coordinated the production with crew and actors here, and as soon as he arrived we shot everything

within one day and he left the next day," Deena added. "It was important for me to protect the vision and cultural aspects of the music video, so just like the song, there are Middle Eastern, Western, and Indian elements in the video. "We wanted to amplify all the influences that shape our style as artists. I cast talented

actors that I've worked with before, wrote a script for an intro and outro scene to incorporate in the full music video - because when I was

younger, music videos had a little bit of acting in them and the artists were just having fun with it!

"So, I wanted to do the same for Xenai and I'm grateful that everyone in the video is an incredible actor so they delivered each performance perfectly." Not one to rest on his laurels, Xenai is already hard at work on his 'biggest project' as he revs up for the release of his first-ever album – *X Files Volume 1 [unidentified]* – comprised of nine songs.

"X Files is the story of an alien in search of home where he comes to realise he was truly in search of himself," he explained.

"The story and concept of the album come to reveal his true nature of who and what he really has been all along on this journey.





"It parallels my meditative journey and the spiritual discoveries that I have been having over the past 11 years and I'm finally at a place where I feel ready to share that part of my life in the form of a story that other people will be able to relate to."

ORMER Bahrain resident and poet David Hollywood is set to drop two books this year – the second volume of his travel series Locals Abroad, and Forgotten Memories featuring his

striking verses. The creative presents several essays and accounts of living in the kingdom in his upcoming release.

"My adventure into travel writing has been inspired by scenes and experiences from Singapore plus encounters in Moldova and the United States of America, all of which are recorded in my first volume (released in 2022)," the Irish bard told GulfWeekly. "This next volume embraces further encounters and continuances within all of those countries but also introduces to the reader several essays and accounts of living in Bahrain."

The five-part series will feature escapades in countries including Antigua, Switzerland, Eleuthera, France, Germany and Croatia.

Speaking about his foray into travel writing, he said: "I was asked by some journalist friends to recount my travels and these were published in Irish newspapers, and to what surprised me to be 'great success', and from there the idea of the books arose."

David called Bahrain home for almost a decade before leaving in 2016, but continues to be a member of the Bahrain Writers Circle. While here, he co-directed the group and subsequently founded and directed its poetry arm - The Second Circle Poetry Group. Living in different regions of the world has helped the creative 'determine some of the sentiments contained within his poetry'.

"Poetry always seems endless in its potential and it speaks to me through the constructions of a genre that touches places inside my mind, heart and spirit. For me, prose is magnificent, but it rides on the coat-tails of poetry.

"When I try to write poetry, I like to give structure, pace, rhyme, tone and meaning to each effort, so that hopefully each effort reflects an attempt that is 'not always

the most obvious within its sense of being understood too readily', yet expectantly contains 'feelings' of satisfaction, or at least emotion, and occasionally mystery," he explained. David's *Forgotten* *Memories* will hit the shelves by the end of the year. In it, he explores 'the soul, the spirit, music, the glories of human achievement, and the depths to which we can fall...'

"Forgotten Memories have



poetry collection, is now in its third edition. The 253page re-print features two essays, 80 poems, including two about Bahrain, and 35 illustrations, all characterised by his 'wonderful eccentricity'.

Intuitions Instincts, the theatre enthusiast's 144-page book, also features three poems about Bahrain. All his works are available as hard copies and digitally.

"I believe sharing poetry is a great liberator of all our senses, emotions and thoughts, and helps us join together with inspirational people who will support and surround us with their own earnestness. My particular interest is to develop a public enthusiasm for poetry among those who aspire to appreciate the genre but haven't yet made the leap into writing or proclaiming their verse.

"Since reestablishing myself in Ireland, I started 'The Red House Poets' group while also hosting a festival, and which has now been replaced by the Lismore & West Waterford Arts Group, with intentions to develop festivals of the written word in combination with music, painting,

sculpture and eventually theatre," the creative, who has spent around 20 years performing on stages in Ireland, Bahrain and The Caribbean, shared.

David presently lives with his wife in Ireland and has four children and one granddaughter. Not one to rest on past laurels, he is already working on a series of projects.

"There are at least three plays being completed, one about schizophrenia and the other about cancer, plus one historical drama about war, and two novels. A series of essays is being prepared for next year together with a volume of short stories," he added.

NTERING La Table Krug at The Ritz-Carlton, Bahrain is akin to stepping into an exclusive French country estate, amidst the heart of Manama. As the first establishment of its kind in the Middle East, and the fourth Krug restaurant concept globally, La Table Krug is a masterpiece of 'rough luxury,' a symphony of raw materials and refined details that orchestrates a dining experience unlike any other.

Our epicurean odyssey commenced with bespoke mocktails, their ethereal matcha foam a prelude to the culinary artistry that awaited. 



Voices in 'harmony'

NDIAN expatriate and musical talent Hashim Rahman has dropped the first of his two singles promoting world peace, a part of his broader peace campaign, which is captivating his 26,000plus fans on YouTube.

The Hindi language composition entitled *Oh God!! Peace* was unveiled during the campaign held last week and features renowned Urdu poet Shahid Meer's verses and revered Palestinian poet Mahmoud Darwish's quotes. Together, they bring alive the story of an artist who is upset about war and, through prayer, 'debates' with God.

"Our world has witnessed discord and war, which inspired me to do something to promote world peace," the 39-year-old, who also stars in the song's promotional video, told *GulfWeekly*.

"I had the idea for a peace campaign where we come together as a community and participate in various activities to promote world peace. I am grateful to all those who participated in making this dream a reality."

The peace campaign was hosted at Kerala Catholic Association's premises and also included painting and charity activities.

The creative from Riffa got together with Indian expatriate and media man Hariz Ekkachu to film the song, which has 'visual elements of war and peace'. The promotional video was shot at

various locations in Bahrain, including Sitra and Karranah beaches. Reputed talents from the Malayalam film industry based in Kerala, India are also part of the team.

The second, Malayalam language track *Hope* is set to release next month.

Hashim has been living in Bahrain with his wife for the last 12 years and they have two children. The category manager who works at Nass foods has led many creative projects in the past, a major one being Rafi Resurrection, which is an ongoing initiative to blow new life into the yesteryear 'evergreen' Indian playback singer Mohammed Rafi's songs.

"Seven of the tracks have featured on Malayalam musical channels like Manorama Music and Millennium Audios and the eighth one *Yaad* will be out on my *YouTube* channel next month," the 2017 first runner-up of Voice of Kerala FM's Gulf region singing competition said.

Hashim has been serenading audiences in Bahrain and Kerala since 2018 but his tryst with music began at the tender age of 10.

Speaking about future plans he announced that he will be releasing two new original singles this year – *Mizhi Chayun*, meaning 'eyes decline', and *Neela Vaanil* or 'in the blue sky' – both Malayalam.

A TALE OF SURVIVAL

MERICAN medieval black comedy The Decameron is out today on Netflix.

Set in 1348's Florence, Italy, the eight-episode series is inspired by the 14th century Italian short-story collection of the same name by Giovanni Boccaccio. It follows a group of nobles who attempt to escape the bubonic plague by taking refuge in a villa.

Created by Kathleen Jordan, who also made the 2020 teen-comedy drama Teenage Bounty Hunters, the period dramedy is expected to have the feel of reality TV with its over-the-top dramatic moments between characters.

"When something like a plague comes along, the ground goes even, it doesn't matter. So what am I investing in? What relationships am I investing in? How am I treating people? That's the stuff that matters," actor Tony Hale, who portrays Sirisco, said in an interview.

British actress Tanya Reynolds, who plays Licisca, expressed her feelings about what she described to be a 'pleasant and joyful atmosphere' while working on the medieval pandemic show.

"It's been probably too fun, I feel like every night I go home and my actual torso aches, my ribs hurt because I've been laughing so much," she said.

"As much as the narrator might want to understand Samuel, there's also a sense that there's a limitation to how fully

we can truly understand his experiences," he said in an interview. "And for me, that's a kind of respect for Samuel's enigmatic quality and the complexity of the characters. That gap becomes part of the narrative, part of what the story is trying to deeply engage with."

RAMMY-NOMINATED rapper Ice Spice's debut album Y2K! is set to release tomorrow.

The American artist, whose music is distinguished by the drill beats and her signature rap flow, says that the tentrack LP will follow suit, but also feature sounds she hasn't experimented with before.

Drill is a subgenre of hip hop music that originated in Chicago in the early 2010s, sonically features synth drum sounds and electronic beats, and tends to be lyrically adversarial and aggressive. The musician stated in an interview that she does not consider herself a lyricist, but rather more focused on making accessible music.

"I do be having bars in my music but they're just super simple, I want them to be digestible, I don't want them to fly over people's heads and they never catch it. I want people to hear it right away and be like, 'okay, that was cute', but it's also fun at the same time."

WWITH just one race separating Formula One championship contenders from the summer break, the 2024 season of racing will be hitting a pivotal point this weekend at the majestic Spa-Francorchamps circuit in Belgium.

The season's unpredictability, with seven different winners in 13 races, shows no signs of abating, and with a resurgent McLaren breathing down Red Bull's neck, the fight for the championship crown has taken a dramatic turn.

CRACKS IN THE ARMOUR Max Verstappen may hold a seemingly comfortable lead in the driver's standings, but Red Bull's dominance is slipping. Bahrain-owned McLaren's Lando Norris' unwavering belief in his title chances is backed by statistics. Since McLaren's significant car upgrade in Miami, the gap between Norris and Verstappen has narrowed considerably. This, coupled

with the looming possibility of a power unit penalty for Verstappen at Spa, injects a potent dose of uncertainty BYBIT HORDUS: Verstappen under pressure into the championship battle.

UNDER THE BULL'S EYE Red Bull's recent struggles have raised eyebrows. Two podium-less finishes in three races and their longest winless streak since 2021 paint a picture of a team under pressure. Their strategic decisions in Hungary, particularly regarding Verstappen's race, came under intense scrutiny. While Red Bull's dominant run has been undeniably impressive, the competitive landscape has shifted dramatically.

The tension within the team is also worth considering. Sergio Perez's crash in Q1 at Hungary, coupled with what Verstappen perceived as a subpar strategy hindering his race, highlighted potential internal friction. While strategic decisions are often complex and involve calculated risks, the focus intensifies when a previously dominant team stumbles. Red Bull's proven track record of success suggests they shouldn't be written off just yet. However, they are facing a tougher dynamic than in recent seasons, and how they navigate this pressure will be a key factor at Spa.

CIRCUIT OF CHALLENGES

Spa-Francorchamps, a revered track on the F1 calendar, presents a unique set of challenges for drivers and teams alike. The stunning location nestled in the Ardennes Forest, with its dramatic elevation changes, flowing layout, and unpredictable weather, has consistently delivered heart-stopping races. McLaren's Oscar Piastri, the newest winner on the grid, considers Spa his favorite circuit. Its ability to disrupt carefully crafted strategies and favour bold overtaking maneuvers makes it a potential breeding ground for another upset.

While the championship fight and driver market drama take centre stage, Spa-Francorchamps always throws in a few curveballs. The notoriously unpredictable Ardennes weather could play a decisive role, with a sudden downpour potentially disrupting the established order and creating opportunities for those who adapt best. Additionally, reliability concerns remain a factor across the grid.

MARKET MOVES

The driver market continues to churn, with Kevin Magnussen's departure from Haas confirmed. This creates a domino effect, with teams and drivers gathering for the last time before the summer break. Expect whispers of potential moves to intensify as everyone involved tries to decipher the complex driver market picture. This crucial window for discussions and strategising will shape the driver line-ups for the remainder of the season.

ADDED SIGNIFICANCE




