GROUP of Indians passionate about cricket is set to kick off the fifth season of their self-created community league championship on Saturday, inspired by the glitz and glamour of the Indian Premier League (IPL), write Avinash Saxena and Melissa Nazareth.

The Abraj Premier League (APL) will see six teams

Abraj Strikers, Abraj
Gladiators, Abraj Supergiants,
Abraj Rocking Royals, Abraj
Violets, and Abraj Daredevils

fight for the winner's trophy
in a fierce yet friendly series
of matches at Water Garden
City in Seef District.

Two matches will be played every Saturday until December 7, when the league takes a winter break. Play will resume on January 7 next year with the final scheduled for February 22. Each of the six teams will play a total of 10 matches, facing off twice in a home and away format. The top four teams will qualify for the next stage, with the table topper getting two chances to qualify for a spot in the final.

Cricket is a bat-and-ball game that is played between two teams of 11 players.

The league, registered with Bahrain Cricket Federation, was founded by seven residents of Abraj Al Lulu residential complex: Abhishek Srivastava, Atul Malhotra, Ashwani Bhatia, Manish Jangid, Rohit Srivastava, Vinit Maroo and Vinod Rathi, mirroring the excitement and competitiveness of the IPL, a men's Twenty20-format cricket league held annually in India.

"What started as a casual gathering of friends eager to play cricket in an organised manner has evolved into a six-team spectacle involving 84 amateur players," chartered accountant Vinod told *GulfWeekly*.

"The Abraj Premier League's appeal has resonated with the Indian expat community, attracting participants of all ages, as young as 15 and as old as 58," he added.

According to Vinod, membership to the club is only open to Indian Abraj Al Lulu residents as there is a common cultural heritage that creates a sense of community.

Vinod, Vinit, Ashwani, and Manish have been joined by Ankit Bhutda, Rakesh Bhujang, Surendra Singh Jaggi and Vinay Gupta in the club's current executive committee.

Like the IPL, the APL conducted an auction in a competitive bidding process with team captains using virtual money to purchase

"Players are graded based on past performance, with newcomers starting in the lowest grade. We list them with base prices, and teams bid for their desired players within their budget. Teams must also adhere to player category limits. The highest bidder wins the player," chartered accountant Ashwani explained.

The upcoming season has seen a surge in interest, with sponsors coming on board to support the tournament.

Two trophies and a range

of prizes are up for grabs.

"As the league's organisers, we have made a lot of effort in fostering a positive and competitive environment, ensuring that everyone feels

welcome and valued," entrepreneur Manish added.

Despite challenges like Bahrain's scorching heat, the organisers have worked tirelessly to create suitable playing conditions. Matches are played on improvised cricket grounds on vacant plots of land with artificial turf laid on a cement surface to make the pitch.

APL has helped to raise awareness of cricket as a sport in Bahrain, and the league's success has demonstrated the potential for grassroots sports development in the kingdom, paving the way for other community-driven initiatives.



The tales must go o



new treasure trove of tales from all walks of life across Bahrain is being put together, with the storyteller behind 100 Bahrain Stories hard at work on a sequel to her popular anthology.

Australian expatriate
Tanzeel Jabbar-Khadir,
45, has started collecting
stories for the new book,
hoping to capture another
snapshot of time in a more
technologically advanced and
post-pandemic Bahrain.

"The last 100 Bahrain Stories ran between 2016 and 2018," she told GulfWeekly. "It was a snapshot of a moment in time.

"Bahrain has evolved since

"Perspectives on life have shifted in the post-pandemic, technologically advanced world we are living in and I thought it would be interesting to capture this."

In this edition, Tanzeel will continue to collect stories from all strata of society - the three tales she has shared so far on the book's *Instagram* include Bangladeshi fruit-seller Mohammad Saleem Ahmed, Bahraini entrepreneurs Jaffer and Khulood and Russian artistengineer Irina Kotova.

"In the previous anthology, I initially chose not to include participants' names when posting the stories on social media, believing it was more important to focus on their content rather than preconceptions about the individuals," she explained.

"This was meant to create a level playing field, showing that each story was equally valuable. However, this decision sparked many questions, and I later added the names in the published book as a gesture of appreciation.

"While still committed to the idea of a level-playing field, this time, I've accepted the feedback from my audience and have decided to include the names from the outset.

"It's important to me to include a diverse range of experiences, highlighting how people, regardless of their background, are more

alike than different and their stories are equally valuable. This diversity enriches the collection, reflecting shared human experiences across different walks of life."

Most interviews that Tanzeel conducts are in English with anyone she might find interesting, although being fluent in Hindi and Urdu also helps her connect with those more comfortable in those languages.

When interviewing people in Arabic, she relies on friends to help her interpret and make the process easy and smooth for each person.

In June this year, Tanzeel released a reprint of the original 100 Bahrain Stories, first printed in 2018, including within it a small tribute to those who had since passed away, like late journalist and entrepreneur Abdullah Jonathan Wallace.

In his foreword to the original book, Abdullah had spoken of how it reflected "not only the broad spectrum of the multinational community of expatriates living in Bahrain today, but the diversity of Bahrainis themselves, whose ancestry has been shaped over five millennia of recorded history."

With stories from nationals hailing from Australia, Bahrain, Bangladesh, Belarus, Belgium, Egypt, France, Germany, India, Ireland, Italy, Jordan, Kenya, Lebanon, Pakistan, Philippines, Singapore, Spain, Sri Lanka, the UK and the US, the book was a true mosaic of the kingdom's cultural canvas, and Tanzeel got a glowing response to the reprint as well.

In the pink of health



S Bahrain shines a 'pink' spotlight on breast cancer awareness this month, Think Pink: Bahrain **Breast Cancer Society is** set to stage a series of events in support of the cause.

Breast cancer is a disease in which abnormal breast cells grow out of control and form tumours.

This year, the global campaign is being driven under the theme 'No-one should face breast cancer alone'.

Every year, Think

Pink Bahrain, a nongovernmental organisation founded by Dr Julie Sprakel, is at the forefront of the national campaign against the illness.

"From staging a 'one-off' dinner in 2004,

which raised BD10,500, to completing 20 years in the kingdom this year, it's been a fulfilling journey, and the community support towards the cause has only grown stronger," the society's president Julie told GulfWeekly.

Embrace nature

MELANCE Riotof colours on canyas



BAHRAIN-BASED creative is hoping to spread his love for nature through art and is currently hosting workshops for aspiring artists on the island.

Egyptian interior designer and painter Mustafa Abobakr is passionate about bringing landscapes alive, which according to him comes from his experience growing up in his hometown, surrounded by nature.

"I grew up next to a river, so all my visual memory consists of greenery, landscapes and the Nile," the 38-year-old told *GulfWeekly*.

"I believe your surroundings, as you grow up, shape who you are as a person and I think if I were born near a desert, for example, I would be a different person

and would have had different influences. Growing up around bodies of water and greenery has turned me into a calm person," he said.

Mustafa strongly believes nature can positively impact the human mind and soul.

"I believe every house in Bahrain needs a green painting because

the colour makes a huge difference to one's wellbeing and regulates their emotions, just like how looking at nature in real life does. That's what I hope people feel when they look at a painting I made," the Adliya resident added.

The creative talent also finds inspiration in paintings from the renaissance era and says the details and techniques in 'such divine art' never fail to



fascinate him.

"I frequent Italy to surround myself with renaissance art, specifically the Vatican museum," he said.

"I spend around five to six hours studying its corners and pieces. I admire the colouring techniques and mediums and the amazing artists from that era, such as Leonardo Da Vinci.

"One renaissance technique

I apply is the 'skies' in which an artist does around two to 20 exercise sketches and paintings before embarking on the final piece.

"If you search about *Mona Lisa*, for example, there are around 10 to 20 copies of the painting by Leonardo that were done for the purpose of exercise, but the final one is the one we see in the Louvre. I keep sketching until I'm

around 60 per cent to 70pc confident," he explained.

The landscape artist has been passionate about art since childhood, however his family wanted him to pursue a degree in engineering.

"So I settled for something in between, which is interior design," the Minia University graduate added.

A member of the Egyptian Fine Arts Syndicate and Bahrain Contemporary Art Association, Mustafa is currently conducting acrylic on canvas workshop and a furniture design course, both at Art Concept gallery in Andalus Garden.

Mustafa moved to Bahrain for work 15 years ago.

"I was working on projects with Saudi companies after I graduated and eventually came to Bahrain. I fell in love with the country and made a lot of good friends and so I moved here," he said.

A fan of classical art, he calls the lovely country a 'home away from home'.

Mustafa has been conducting art and design sessions for children and adults over the last nine years. He also hosts acrylic painting workshops and believes 'everybody is an artist'.

"I want everyone to join art classes and I believe it's good for our well-being. We are constantly busy on our phones and social media. It's important to put your phone aside and reflect your feelings on a painting. Everybody can do it, all you need is to find the best medium and artistic direction, whatever makes you comfortable, and not think about others' judgement," he added.

MERICAN musical psychological thriller film Joker: Folie à Deux (French for 'madness of two') is now out in theatres.

Starring Joaquin Phoenix reprising his role as Arthur Fleck, known as Joker, and Lady Gaga as his love interest Harleen 'Lee' Quinzel or Harley Quinn, the DC comics-based film is set two years after the events of the 2019 crime drama, Joker.

It follows the now Arkham State Hospital patient as he falls in love with fellow inmate, resulting in the two experiencing life as a musical through their linked insanity.

Despite the 2019 film being intended as a standalone with no sequels, director Todd Phillips had revealed that Joaquin pushed for the idea of a sequel because he did not feel ready to leave the character behind.

"I remember I posted a picture from the last day of the first Joker many years ago, and Joaquin was hugging me with tears in his eyes," Todd said in an interview.

"That's not because he wasn't going to see me again; that was really because we kind of fell in love with Arthur, and we thought there was more to tell in Arthur's journey," he added.

In June 2022, it was officially announced by the director that the sequel was in development.

The actress and singer also released an album inspired

"This idea of dual identities was always something that was part of my musicmaking, I was always creating characters in my music and when I made Lee

for Joker, she just really had this profound effect on me," Gaga said in an interview.

"The film had so much music in it, so much music that I love, and I was able to discover the character through the story, through the music that we did live every day as well as dance and the costumes and the makeup.

"So I kind of had this deep experience with the character and she just didn't really leave me creatively and I decided I wanted to make a whole album inspired by her," she added.


BREAKING A CURSE

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


