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SYCHOLOGISTS and psychiatrists have highlighted the impact the ongoing Gaza conflict is having on people living outside the war zone and offered ways to cope with the tragedies unfolding as **World Mental Health Day** is commemorated today.

As part of our *Speak* Your Mind series, readers have been sharing stories about how they are seeing depression and stress being aggravated by images and videos shared on social media which report on worsening conditions as Israel continues its onslaught across the strip.

In a recent regional study, academics found that in the immediate aftermath of the October 7 Hamas attacks, and subsequent retaliation described by many as genocide of the Palestinians, exposure to explicit accounts of war was correlated with insomnia, deeper depression and heightened stress levels.

The study titled *Mediating* effect of depression and acute stress between exposure to Israel-Gaza war media coverage and insomnia was conducted by a group of Arab researchers.

"In the last three months, I saw four patients who came in stating that they are facing a concern with what they are seeing and hearing about the conflict," American Mission Hospital clinical psychologist Dr Feba Percy Paul told GulfWeekly.

"Now, most of them have a past history of depression or any mood-related affective disorder.

"Although they have been well and stabilised, but when they saw a news like this, it got triggered, and they are not able to sleep."

Many of these patients reported feeling an existential concern during their appointments, as well as guilt over being happy, and other day-to-day emotions.

Another study, *Empathic* Engagement with Gaza: Dynamics, Impact, and Prospects conducted by Bahrain University professor Dunya Ahmed,

in collaboration with Rwandan researchers, notes the risk of compassion fatigue and vicarious trauma.

"Overconsumption of news around conflicts can

lead to 'vicarious trauma' or 'secondary traumatic stress', where individuals not directly affected by the conflict experience emotional distress from constantly

consuming media about it," Dr Feba added, clarifying that the condition is related to Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD).

"We also see compassion fatigue among individuals who want to extend empathy, but are now exhausted because there is no result from it, and that creates a high level of dissatisfaction in life."

In the Empathic *Engagement* study, researchers note that this results in a diminished capacity to empathise due to emotional exhaustion, often accompanied by decreased motivation and increased cynicism.

"The ongoing conflict in Palestine remains unresolved, and this enduring situation has left many individuals, including my patients, feeling a profound sense of powerlessness," Child Foundation Centre founder and licensed consultant psychologist Dr Mariam

Alammadi told GulfWeekly. "The long-term effects of the conflict are difficult to predict, particularly as we witness the daily suffering of the Palestinian people,

emotional responses." To combat the immediate impact of vicarious trauma, Dr Feba suggests 'the four

which can evoke a range of

- A's': Awareness
- Action
- Acceptance, and
- Avoiding assumptions. "Be aware of your thoughts

- are you channeling your emotions or sticking to facts?" she added.

"Be action oriented and focus on what you can do with the resources you have.

"Accept reality, know what is in and out of your control, and accept that the human race can be unkind, which can be very difficult.

"Avoid assumptions. Don't judge others around us or assume that they aren't feeling compassion to the same extent that we are, or make accusations against each other."

Confluence of minds



NE of the kingdom's oldest writers' groups is set to unveil the seventh edition of its annual exhibition, Confluence - Where words and images meet, on Saturday, showcasing diverse themes like 'crimes against women', 'childhood memories', 'hope' and 'transition'.

Bahrain Writers' Circle (BWC), a volunteer group established in 2011 by former Bahrain resident and bestselling author Robin Barratt, will stage the event under the patronage of renowned Bahraini poet and novelist Hameed Al Qaed.

Visitors can enjoy personal experiences brought alive through poetry, prose and various art forms including paintings, mixed media art, installation and photography. More than 25 entries by Bahrain-based creative talents, as well as former BWC members who have left the island but continue to be part of the group, will be on display.

The exhibition's concept is the brainchild of founding member and former BWC director Rohini Sunderam, who currently lives in Canada.

The idea behind Confluence is for the art to be inspired by the words or the other way around - 'confluence'. BWC writers collaborate with artists from within the circle and beyond.

"The Bahrain Writers' Circle celebrates our annual tradition through expression of universal personal experiences, revealing deeper insights through poetry and art," BWC director Saira Ranj told GulfWeekly.

"Serving as a mirror of society, we bring you artists that capture their cultural values, current struggles, and transformations through the written word as well as a visual outlet. It will make you think, feel and process perspectives," she added.

The event will be inaugurated at 7pm in a public ceremony on the second floor concourse of the Bahrain Financial Harbour's Harbour Gate, which has over the years earned a

reputation as a 'vibrant hub that fosters artistic and cultural connections'.

American expatriate and former real estate agent Chelsea Chacon will exhibit two poems, inspired by her attempts to accept the pace of life.

"Moths deals with the inevitability of change and our failed attempts to stop it and Little Treats captures the feeling of how society's standard of beauty cages in the potential of a person," Chelsea said.

"When I showed my art partner my poems, I knew she'd only enhance the feeling my words provoke. I liked the idea of an emotionally heavy poem portrayed in watercolours. She portrayed the vulnerability in a deceptively benign light," she explained sharing her experience teaming up with Bahrainbased artist Madhu S.

The 35-year-old from Seef District is participating for the first time and hopes to



meet more writers and artists. British expat and former Bahrain resident Darius Abbasi is set to present his inspired musings - Rootless Nights and The Edge - and will be flying in from the UAE especially for the event.

"I am excited to meet everyone and visit Bahrain, and Confluence is the perfect opportunity to do that," the creative, who currently works as a digital engagement director, said.

Darius is collaborating with Bahrain-based artists: entrepreneur Anita Menon, who is also a BWC member, and mental health practitioner and DJ Reema Alajaji.

"I wrote a few poems, then shared it with the two artists to choose one that speaks to them. One of my poems is about the sense of not belonging, being rootless, but still loving and being loved. The other is about being free and vulnerable, aiming high but being curious and so, paying for it all," he explained.



Bahraini author Noor Al Noaimi has worked on a piece inspired by 'the reality of women's lives and their safety across the world'. She was deeply touched by the recent Kolkata (India) case in which a young doctor was raped and murdered on her college premises, which led Noor to create the poem.

"I usually write prose, but the gravity of this situation prompted poetry out of me and I'm glad to be able to use Bahrain Writers' Circle's platform to highlight this issue," the author of The Pearl Thief revealed.

Noor has tied up with Bahrain-based creative entrepreneur Kaav Ranj, 24, who has worked on an oiland-acrylic painting heavily influenced by Noor's words.

"It is a sensitive poem, so I wanted to showcase the pain while keeping the face relatively anonymous and shrouded – so everyone can see a bit of themselves in relation to these situations," the Indian expat and multidisciplinary artist added.

RAVELLING for food, or culinary tourism, has soared in popularity over the last few years but what is really fascinating is how, throughout history, food has travelled with us.

Take, for example, the doner kebab.

Seasoned meat stacked and cooked on a vertical rotisserie is a familiar sight across the Middle East, and whether we call it gyro, shawarma or something else comes down to semantics, spices and seasonings.

The cooking style dating back to the Ottoman Empire donned a new garb when it travelled with Turkish immigrants to Berlin in the 1960s and 1970s and soon, in a new land, was reborn as the doner kebab.

Cut to today, and with annual sales of more than 3.5 billion euros in Germany alone, the doner kebab returned last weekend to its home region as a celebrated part of the Oktoberfestthemed brunch at the Four Seasons Hotel Bahrain Bay.

And yes, when we stopped by the hotel's Bahrain Bay Kitchen for its bountiful brunch, we also had our fill of iconic German specialties, from the live schnitzel station, to the tall pretzel stand, paired with classic German salads like Bavarian cucumber or sausage salad, smoky steckerlfisch and tender Bavarian-style beef short ribs.





ANIMATED ADVENTURE



Based on the 1996 Tomb Raider video game series, the show follows intelligent and athletic archaeologist Lara Croft who travels the world in search of lost artefacts and exploring dangerous tombs and ruins.

The eight episodes will be set in the same universe as the 2013 video game reboot trilogy and take place after the events of 2018's *Shadow of the Tomb Raider*.

Showrunner Tasha Huo, a lover of the franchise, revealed in an interview that fans can expect the animated show to fill gaps that were not explored in the video games, such as Lara's backstory and relationships.

"I feel like, in playing the games, you miss a whole section of Lara's life, which is: what is it like beyond the tombs? What are her relationships like? I was always so curious when Lara could call up a friend in the middle of nowhere in Thailand. How did she meet that person," Tasha said.

"The show gets to explore how she made these relationships and the origin story of a lot of her life that we just take for granted when we meet her in those 90's games," she added.

Marvel star Hayley Atwell will be voicing the protagonist Lara, who Tasha described as the 'perfect encapsulation of Lara', as she was filming for the blockbuster franchise Mission Impossible the same time she was recording for the series.

"It was a lot of, 'Oh, I did that stunt last week, so I know exactly what that sounds like'.

"Hayley, herself, is a natural adventurer, while also being just an incredible dramatic actress. So she is the perfect encapsulation of Lara during this sort of bridge period of time," Tasha added.

RAIDER: Lara

Earl Baylon will also be reprising his role from the video game trilogy as Jonah Maiava, alongside Allen Maldonado who voices Lara's tech expert Zip, a character whose last appearance in the franchise was in the 2008 game *Tomb Raider: Underworld*.

NIMATED comedy film 10 Lives is out now in theatres. Starring stand-up comedian Mo Gillian, the film plays with the cultural myth of cats having multiple lives, as it follows the story of Beckett, a selfish housecat rescued and loved by Rose (Simone Ashley), who uses up all his nine lives. **After Beckett loses**

his final life, he begs gatekeeper Grace, who's responsible for the afterlife of animals, to return to his former life, and he has his wish granted.

However, he returns with a new set of different lives in different forms: badger, rat, cockroach, parrot, fish, dog and horse.

In an interview with the cast, director and screenwriter Chris Jenkins explained that the film's concept came from the idea



of 'loving our pets and wondering what their inner lives are'.

Simone added that she believes the film showcases Beckett learning to appreciate life and his human companion.

"We see Beckett on the journey of, maybe, learning to be a bit more generous and present and grateful for the life that he has and opening his heart up to Rose and to the concept of love," she added.

SIGNATURE SOUNDS, POP INFLUENCES

ERMAN musical act Cascada (Spanish for 'waterfall') mark their return with Studio 24, releasing tomorrow.

Known for their smash hits Everytime We Touch (2005) and Evacuate the Dancefloor (2009), the group's new project comes as part of their 20th anniversary celebration this year - the album title refers to the year 2024.

Besides planned original material, the musical creation will also include covers of American singer-songwriter and musician Marvin Gaye's *Ain't No Mountain High Enough* (cover released on March 15) and American rock band Blondie's *Call Me* (June 21).

Comprising singer Natalie Horler and DJs/producers Manian (Manuel Reuter) and Yanou (Yann Peifer), the group's highly anticipated fifth studio album is their first full-length release since 2011's *Original Me*.

However, the trio has been actively touring and collaborating with other popular artists in the past years; the singles *Back for Good* with Dutch DJ and producer Hardwell (Robbert van de Corput) dropped in

2018 and *Never Let Me Go* with Australian musician and DJ Timmy Trumpet (Timothy Jude Smith) in 2021.

In an interview, Natalie expressed the group's gratefulness for still having an audience that is interested in their old and new music and show up to their live sets 20 years later.

"I'm still very, very lucky to work as much as I do and it's obviously because of the old music I've released in the past, of course," Natalie said.

"We're still current to a certain extent, even though we're not in the (music) charts everywhere. But we are still releasing music," she added.

She also noted that the trio's 'tricky' music-making process of wanting to stick to their signature dance sound, while also adapting to the modern-day pop world, is something fans are looking forward to hearing in the new project.

"We do try to go back and forth a little bit because you want to give the fans what they like, it is a very difficult line to find that balance," she added.

"You want to go with the times as well."

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
