An artistic tour



RT enthusiasts in the kingdom can win a stunning piece of work by renowned Bahraini artist Abbas Almosawi, who will be holding a raffle draw as part of a series of 12 exhibitions being held across Bahrain to celebrate 50 golden years of his creative journey.

People seeking to take part in the draw must visit all 12 exhibitions where they can get their cards 'stamped' as proof. They must then drop it at the Abbas Almosawi Gallery located in Al Qurayyah.

The raffle will be held by the end of the month and multiple winners will be announced in a grand ceremony - the date and venue for which will be announced later.

Lucky winners will also take home other exciting prizes such as merchandise and gift vouchers.

The initiative runs until the end of the year and coincides with Bahrain National Day, which is celebrated on December 16 and 17.

"I introduced the stamp system to encourage people to visit all locations and also to reward them for putting in the time and energy to explore the art," Abbas told GulfWeekly.

The renowned artist decided to exhibit his works at various locations, instead of a museum, as he wanted to provide art lovers - especially those who are new to the kingdom - an opportunity to discover different cities in Bahrain. He also hopes to target passers-by who might be interested in art.

"I wanted to collaborate with malls and institutions to make art more accessible, and to have people of all kinds exposed to it," Abbas said

"If you display your art in museums, you will only have your people show up, who are familiar with your work, or people who are artists or

interested in art. But I want passers-by to be captured by the art and stop to observe it.

"I'm thankful for the support of the Tourism Ministry.

"I have curated this 'celebration' for the benefit of visitors and tourists by exposing them to vibrant art, and also to encourage them to discover Bahrain at the same time, as I chose stops that are in different areas in the kingdom," he added.

The initiative kickstarted in November, when the first exhibition entitled 50 Years of Art and Peace was unveiled at Bahrain Authority for Culture and Antiquities' (Baca) art centre. The showcase portrayed fond memories from his childhood and his deep connection with the sea, harbours and

traditional spaces, among other things.

The art series ties in various themes, bringing alive Bahrain's rich heritage and

tradition.

Seef Mall, located in Seef District, for instance, is showcasing *Modernity and Authenticity*, which centres

around the magnificent Arabian horse. The paintings depict strokes of genius, displaying this majestic beast through the eyes of the artist.


Another one in the series focuses on the theme women. Exhibited at Riyadat mall in A'ali, the artworks present the painter's creative interpretations, paying a tribute to the 'feminine'.

A 'son of the environment', Abbas' art, which is based on the school of impressionism, is largely inspired by nature. Impressionism is a 19th-century art movement, characterised by relatively small, thin, yet visible brush strokes, accurate depiction of light, and unusual visual angles, among other things.

The artist, who majored in interior design from Cairo University, has a repertoire of more than 3,000 paintings, and has used his skill to spread peace.

In 1991, he launched the Art for Peace project, during the Gulf War, and was able to get his message to the United Nations session in Geneva in 2000



OUR Bahrain-based wordsmiths have been spotlighted in the bilingual poetry anthology Waqt ek Rahasya (Hindi for 'time is a mystery'), which features creative interpretations of the construct, and will be officially launched on Saturday.

Homemaker and 'teacher at heart' Garima Kapoor, 47, educator Nivedita Roy, 53, artist Pallavi Jain, 51, and architect and painter Sudeep Deshpande, 43, have contributed to the collection of Hindi and English poems by 62 poets from Bahrain, India and the US.

The book has been curated by India-based award-winning poet Neelam Saxena who leads the Literary Warriors Group – a set of like-minded individuals who connect for their love of the written word.

The Indian expatriates from the kingdom are active members of the group.

Dr Renu Mishra and Asha Singh Gaur, also from the sub-continent, have edited the publication. In addition to being published poets, they pursue diverse interests, from arts to social work and are accomplished in their fields. Asha has also designed the cover.

Um Al Hassam resident Garima, who has been living in Bahrain with her husband Deepak Mittai and daughter Diya for the last 17 years, has participated with the Hindi poem *Waqt, khud ko thoda aur waqt de* (Time, give yourself more time), which brings alive the rat race that most people live.


"There is hardly any time to sit back and thoroughly enjoy life with a carefree mind," the Indian from Patna city, told *GulfWeekly*.

"In this poem, I have requested for time to slow down and urged readers

to 'give themselves more time'," she added.

Garima has also contributed *Samay* (time), which touches upon the 'importance and power of time'.

"Time turns its wheels and makes us aware of many things," she noted.

Al Raja School teacher Nivedita, who has delved into a timely sub-theme for one of her entries, said: "My Hindi poem *Naya Saal* (New Year) expresses how we move into the New Year, hoping for better days, while we gather

some memories of the year that has passed."

"In my English contribution Weaving On, my quill has delved into various emotions that cry for escape and healing as we face umpteen upheavals over time - pleasant and unpleasant surprises during the course of life," the creative talent from Lucknow added.

The Adliya resident is set to host the

book launch at the Pune International Literature Festival on Saturday.

Environmentalist Pallavi has looked to her muse – nature – for her verses. In her English poem entitled *Flow*, she compares time to a river – they both flow.

"The verses are inspired by my advice to my son when he left Bahrain to pursue his higher education," the creative who grew up in Uttarakhand state said.

The Saar resident even created an artwork to express the idea through a different medium, which she exhibited at a local art and poetry exhibition in October.

"My Hindi contribution entitled *Waqt* (time) explores

the importance of time. Writing for the anthology has been a meditative experience and brought me solace and peace," she added.

Sudeep Deshpande, who lives with his wife Snigdha and their many feline fur babies in Adliya, has contributed a Hindi poem to the anthology, which explores 'transitions'.

"In my verses, I talk about the 'waves' or transitions that one will face when one's time of achievement arrives," the Indian expat from Nasik who has had a base in Pune for the last 28 years, explained.

"There will be 'tests' and opportunities for 'growth', when one walks on one's destined path, and one will go through a state of dilemma, self-doubt, and self-conflict. But there will be 'desire' and 'curiosity' too that will keep one going," he added, explaining the thought process behind his work.

Sudeep warned that the 'path' is often lonely but when people face it and move forward, they will be in rhythm with their path and that's the moment when the 'destiny of one's achievement is born'.

LASSICAL dancer and Indian expatriate Prarthana Praveen has staged her first-ever solo public Bharatanatyam performance at the age of 16, a dream she nurtured from the tender age of nine.

Arangetram or dance debut symbolises a 'graduation' ceremony, making the student eligible to pursue the art as a career through teaching or accepting commissioned performances.

The event, which was graced by Parliament's foreign affairs, defence and national security committee chairman MP Dr Hassan Bukhammas, and other important members of the community, was held at Ramee Grand Hotel and Spa, Seef. It featured eight solo acts by the grade 11 New Millennium School science stream student.

The 90-minute performance comprised eight acts, with breaks after the first three sets and then the next two difficult test, considering the physical effort and multiple attire changes, but the young talent was determined to take it to the end.

Bharatanatyam is one of the oldest Indian classical dance forms and is derived from bhavam (expression), ragam (music), talam (rhythm), and natyam (dance).

"This will always be an unforgettable milestone in



"The experience was a perfect blend of excitement, hard work, and personal growth," she added.

"Of course, it wasn't without its challenges - long rehearsals, nerves before the performance, and the pressure of getting every step perfect - but with the support of my teacher and the encouragement from my loved ones, I was able to

overcome those hurdles and truly enjoy the moment."

While Prarthana had been preparing for her big day since March this year, with daily practice sessions focusing on perfecting her technique, expression, and rhythm, she aspired to present her first solo performance more than two years ago. However, her dance teacher Hansul Ghani felt that she needed more time, according to mum Ramanpreet, better known as Preety.

"We were told she is ready to perform as part of a group, but we were very keen on a solo act. Well, the wait was worth it. We, as a family, are so proud of her achievement

and have watched her work dedicatedly towards this goal.

"I want to offer a special mention to Prarthana's dance teacher for training her and preparing her so well," Preety noted, adding that she had always wanted to train in dance but couldn't, making her daughter's achievement all the more exciting for her.

Preety went on to narrate the first time she observed a spark for dance in Prarthana. They were halted at a traffic signal on the way to Prarthana's school when the young talent saw a shooting star and said out loud, 'one day I will become the best Bharatanatyam dancer in the world'. The rest, as they say, is 'her'story.

"From a young age, I was drawn to the grace and storytelling of Bharatanatyam, and as I grew older, I began to appreciate the discipline and spirituality it offers," the Bahrain-raised prodigy, who has an older brother Pranav, studying artificial intelligence and machine learning in Bangalore, India, explained.

"The sense of connection I feel when dancing, whether it's with my own body, the music, or the audience, has kept me inspired to continue learning year after year."

While Prarthana is still savouring the memories from her performance, she is clear

about the way forward.

"As I step into the New Year, my dance goals are centred on growth, consistency, and selfexpression," she said.

"I aim to refine my technique further by focusing on perfecting my footwork, posture and expressions. I also want to challenge myself by learning more advanced choreographies and exploring new styles of dance to broaden my horizons.

"Along with technical improvement, I hope to deepen my emotional connection to each performance, allowing my storytelling to resonate more with the audience," she said.

The publication is a collection of stories that blend humour and cultural observations. It also features Faisal's personal experiences and is available at Jarir bookstore.






