SEVERAL initiatives are being staged across Bahrain to raise awareness about autism and celebrate the abilities and achievements of individuals on the spectrum, coinciding with World Autism Awareness month in April.

Special Families Support (SFS) Bahrain group has made a striking collage of handprints, showcasing their commitment to the cause.

The artistic initiative is part of their special campaign entitled 'Growing together in autism acceptance'.

SFS families and friends were invited to share handprints of any colour with their name on it and the submissions were compiled to produce the collage.

"This month, we celebrate our neurodiverse children and the SFS family," a representative of the support group told *GulfWeekly*.

"While spreading awareness is important, our campaign stresses on acceptance and advocacy, post awareness, as both of these are equally needed.

"Those who shared the handprints took an oath pledging their support to the cause," she added.

SFS has creatively defined 'AUTISM' by giving a new meaning to each letter, with 'a' standing for advocate acceptance, 's' for support independence and so on.

Autism Spectrum Disorder is a neurological and developmental disorder that affects how people interact with others, communicate, learn, and behave.

The United Nations designated April 2 as World Autism Awareness Day, however, supporters of the cause worldwide focus on activities and campaigns throughout April.

This year's theme is 'Advancing Neurodiversity and the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)', highlighting the intersection between neurodiversity and global sustainability. It aims to showcase how inclusive policies and practices can drive positive change for autistic individuals worldwide and contribute to

Individuals with autism will receive special recognition as well.

"We are planning to stage a motorcycle ride for the cause on April 25," Shahzaib's Club House founder and director Amena Shahrukh said, adding that more details will be announced soon.

Shahzaib's Club House is a local community of differently abled people. It was founded by Amena three years ago, as an extension of her personal journey with her late son, Mohammed Shahzaib Lali, who was differently abled, and died of pneumonia at the age of 21.

Beyond the lines



AHRAIN-LOVING caricature artist Amani Ali Badir uses her creative cartoons to capture and immortalise timeless moments, with a fun twist.

The 26-year-old South African has been caricaturing her way through ghabgas, comic conventions and private events across the GCC, ever since she flew from her home several months ago.

"I got into caricaturing about three years ago, starting off with sketches of people's pets," the self-taught artist told GulfWeekly.

"Bahrain has been home to my two sisters for a couple years now. Up until the beginning of this year, I had only seen photos of Bahrain they shared, and on *Instagram*. So I decided to pack a bag, get on a plane and check it out for myself!"

Although a lifelong artist, it has been her live caricaturing that has been feeding Amani's creative soul for the last several years.

This, more than anything, is why she believes Artificial Intelligence (AI-generated) art can never replace a live caricature experience.

"For me, caricature art stands out from any and every art - not just AI," she explained.

"Creating a caricature is an in-the-moment experience



and in a few minutes, you get to take an original artwork home! Nothing like it anywhere else. Along with the memory of a sweet moment you had with the artist. It's such a gift."

Amani's journey into caricaturing live was almost accidental, when she was contacted for a unique

"A man wanted to propose to his girlfriend, so he asked me to set up in a flea market so I could pretend to draw while they browsed around," she reminisced.

"He had to convince her (girlfriend) to do a caricature 'just for fun' and when it was time to show them the

final piece, I pulled out the drawing I had previously done, which had 'Will You Marry Me?' written over it.

"I just loved the experience and two years later, after dabbling in candles, T-shirts and other creative mediums, I decided to get into caricature full-time."

Since she flew out to the GCC from Pretoria, South Africa, a couple of months ago, Amani has done much of her caricaturing in Bahrain, with a short trip to Qatar for Geekend last month.

Nerdy pop culture conventions like Geekend in Doha and Comfest in Bahrain have been especially fun for Amani, who plans

to travel to Kuwait and the UAE for more such events.

To keep up with her regular travels, she has kept her artist kit lean, just using Japanese brush marker pens, Faber Castell charcoal pastels and a Monte Marte paper in addition to the mixed media

paper on which she draws her

Amongst the many skills she has picked up along the way is 'how to balance humour with respect'.

"This is a skill that is learned every day, and with every interaction and connection with my clients,"

"I begin with the most visible part of the face for me - the eyebrows, and from there I go on to develop the

"A key part to making people recognisable in a caricature is to focus on the distance of facial features in conjunction to each other.

"The actual features (eyes, nose, mouth) can be played with and are exaggerated to one's style.

"I am so grateful that I get to draw, and have drawn delightful, giving and open people. This makes creating art an honour and something very special."

O matter where his passion for photography has taken him, from the redhot Bahrain International Circuit to the freezing Swiss Alps, Bahrainbased shutterbug Premjith Narayanan has been unwaveringly focused on finding the moments that click.

Recently, the Indian expatriate's stunning shots at the Lauberhorn Alpine Ski World Cup were featured in the March 2025 edition of *Photo Plus: The Canon Magazine*, and not one to rest on his laurels, he is already gearing up to cover the 2025 Formula 1 Gulf Air Grand Prix, taking place next weekend, from April 11 to 13.

"I've always been drawn to challenges in photography," Premjith told *GulfWeekly*.

"When I first heard about the unique difficulties of ski photography, I knew I had to give it a try. The combination of technical skill, physical endurance and artistic vision required was irresistible to me.

"And ski photography is not for the faint of heart. It's a unique challenge that sets it apart from other sports photography.

"Picture this: you're standing in -15 to -20 Celsius weather, your fingers barely able to press the shutter button. The air is thin, making each breath a conscious effort. But that's what makes it so exciting!

"The cold is your constant companion. It's not just about bundling up; it's about finding ways to keep your gear functioning and your creativity flowing."

Stunning ski shots have dazzled fans all over the world, but Premjith knows what it takes to capture each one.

He has to trudge through snow with his Canon cameras and 400 to 500mm lenses, or, as he describes it, 'what feels like a small canon' through the snow, and that's even before his

photography starts!

Since his first time doing ski photography in 2013, he has perfected techniques ranging from the freeze frames with fast shutter speeds to panning shots with slow shutter speeds capturing the thrill of the moment.

And many of these skills and techniques were perfected over more than 20 years of covering the Bahrain Grand Prix, although the Ski World Cup was even more unforgiving - where 'if you mess up, the whole picture gets spoilt and you don't get a second chance', he explained.

"I find F1 photography more comfortable overall," he added.

"The controlled environment of a race track is a stark contrast to the unpredictable mountain slopes.

"Plus, the repeated laps in F1 give me a sense of security, I know I'll have another chance if I miss a shot.

"That said, there's something special about capturing that perfect moment on the ski slopes. The challenge makes the reward even sweeter.

"My experience in F1 photography didn't just help – it transformed my approach to ski photography. The skills I'd developed over years of capturing high-speed action translated beautifully to the slopes."

The engineer by profession is currently road-tripping around the US, where his eldest son is based, before returning to Bahrain in time for this year's Grand Prix.

"There are still lots of 'next's' in my photography life even though I have travelled far and wide around the world to capture exotic places," he noted.

"Easter Islands, Galapagos islands, Pyramids of Mexico, Brazil carnival, Iguazu Falls, Seychelles, Machu Pichu, Angkor Wat, Nazca Lines in Peru, Antarctica's penguins and more... the list is eternal!"





DULT animated series *Devil May Cry* is out now on *Netflix*.

Based on the namesake Japanese video game franchise by Capcom, the show follows demon hunter Dante, voiced by Johnny Yong Bosch, who fights sinister forces at the portal between the human and demon realms, with the fate of both worlds resting in his hands.

Creator and showrunner Adi Shankar said that fans of the beloved game will have a good time watching the eight-

episode adaptation, which he has been tirelessly working on with his development partner Alex Larsen since its announcement in 2018.

"Rest assured, we are working very hard because we love the franchise and because we want to deliver something great," Adi said in an interview.

"Our goal wasn't just to pump out another animated show. My goal is to make one of the best shows on the *Netflix* platform," he added.

Released in 2001 for PlayStation 2, the game is loosely based on the Italian poem *Divine Comedy* by Dante Alighieri, with allusions like the lead character's name - players assume the role of 'Dante'.

During its development, it was initially intended

to be a part of Capcom's *Resident Evil* franchise, but later became its own title as the staff felt it fit better as a standalone.

The game was met with positive critical acclaim and quickly earned a dedicated fan-base. The franchise currently consists of five video games released across several gaming consoles and on PC.


The only one without a shop is the bachelor son, but

"Dice Death is the story of a young, vibrant person and his tragic love," a representative of the production told GulfWeekly.

MUSICAL CROSSROADS

MERICAN actor and musician Djo, aka Joe Keery, is set to drop his third studio album The Crux tomorrow.

The synth-pop creation dives into themes of community, collaboration and character, with the concept being a hotel that houses guests who are at crossroads in their lives.

The project is expected to be a follow-up to Joe's previous release *Decide* (2022), which earned breakthrough success last

year when the song *End* of *Beginning* became the sixth most streamed track of 2024 on *Spotify*, after it became viral on *TikTok*.

"I didn't plan for that to happen, you know? The fact that people really connect with the song is amazing. Then, to be able to sing it as a massive group is beyond my wildest dreams," Joe said in an interview.

The artist is best known for playing Steve Harrington in the *Netflix* series *Stranger Things*.

Extra spice for Tsunoda's homecoming at Suzuka

UKI Tsunoda's elevation to a Red Bull seat in time for his home Japanese Grand Prix at Suzuka this weekend has changed the whole dynamic of the third round of a Formula One season so far dominated by McLaren.

Red Bull's brutal demotion of Liam Lawson to the Racing Bulls team after just two races has finally handed Tsunoda the chance to take on the role of teammate to four-time world champion Max Verstappen.

As the only Japanese driver on the grid, Tsunoda was always going to get plenty of attention but his weekend will now be the subject of intense scrutiny as he navigates the RB21 around the figure-of-eight track south of Nagoya.

"(It) couldn't be a crazier situation than this, like first race, debut with the Red Bull car, also in the home grand prix," Tsunoda said.

"You know, I think the amount of pressure I'm going to get will be definitely one of the most I'm going to get in my life.

"And also the big challenge



ahead is that you have to get used to it as soon as possible in order to perform straight away in Suzuka, which I need to."

Tsunoda, in his fifth season in Formula One, has perhaps wisely limited his expectations to finishing in the top nine as he takes up a role that has proved a poisoned chalice to many a driver before Lawson.

New Zealander Lawson has put a brave face on his demotion but will surely be determined to do his best to make Red Bull regret their decision as he returns to a familiar car at a circuit he knows well from his days in Japan's Super Formula.

From the evidence of Melbourne and Shanghai, Red Bull will have to show clear improvement to challenge McLaren at Suzuka unless Sunday's forecast rain produces the sort of chaos in which Verstappen thrives.

The Dutchman, who trails McLaren's Lando Norris by eight points in the drivers' standings, will otherwise need to squeeze a bit more pace out of his car if he is to become the first driver to win four straight Japanese Grands

Mercedes are already 21 points ahead of Red Bull in the constructors' championship after the team's best start to a season since 2021.

George Russell's two third places along with a fourth and eighth for teenager Andrea Kimi Antonelli are evidence of a consistency the team has struggled to produce in recent years and they are

the most likely challengers to pacesetters McLaren.

Oscar Piastri's victory in China gave McLaren three straight wins for the first time since 2012 and he and Norris, who won in Australia, will resume their personal duel while looking to collect as many points as possible while some rivals struggle.

Ferrari's threatened challenge has yet to materialise despite the twin threat of Lewis Hamilton and Charles Leclerc and it hit a major roadbump in China where both cars were disqualified for technical infringements.

The team will be certain to ensure both cars are compliant on Sunday but they will also need more performance if seven-times world champion Hamilton is to have a chance of a sixth win, or Leclerc a first, at Suzuka.

Fernando Alonso won twice in Japan in 2006 and 2008 but has yet to finish a race this season for Aston Martin, while Carlos Sainz, third last year for Ferrari, is another grand prix winner yet to look entirely comfortable in his new home at Williams.

MAX SAYS GOODBYE 'FOR NOW' TO HONDA

AX Verstappen has hinted at a future relationship with Honda after the Japanese engine maker's highly successful partnership with Red Bull finishes at the end of the Formula One season.

Honda engines have fired the 27-year-old Dutchman to four successive world titles with Red Bull but from 2026 they will be powering the cars of the Aston Martin team.

At a Formula One fan day run by Honda in Tokyo yesterday, ahead of this weekend's Japanese Grand Prix, Verstappen expressed his gratitude.

"It's been a ride that I

enjoyed a lot," he told fans after driving the RB16B, the car in which he won his first world title, on the streets of Japan's capital.

"Of course before we started working with Honda, we had our success. But I could have never imagined the heights that we got to, winning four championships together.

"I want to try and just enjoy the weekend, try to go as fast as you can, but it's more about also just remembering all that we have achieved together in the sport and who knows, of course, in the future as well?

"You know what can be done. So it's like a goodbye for now, but that's it. I'm still quite young and you never



know what happens in the future."


Verstappen's comments will further fuel speculation that he may not see out his contract at Red Bull, which runs through the 2028 season.

Media reports have suggested that the Dutchman has performance-related exit clauses that would allow him to leave if the Red Bull car was not competitive.

Former F1 driver Juan Pablo Montoya said he thinks Aston Martin would make Verstappen a hugely tempting offer if he had cause to trigger those clauses.


