OUNG Bahraini filmmakers presented three documentaries showcasing Bahrain's rich culture and close-knit community, in a grand red carpet event, culminating the third edition of Project Documentaries.

The initiative was staged by the US Embassy, in partnership with the Youth Affairs Ministry, at EPIX Cinemas, Dana Mall on Tuesday.

Youth Affairs Minister Rawan Tawfiqi, US Ambassador Steven Bondy and other guests attended.

A total of six awards were presented across various categories for the three films that were screened.

The visual creations were projects that 18 creatives worked on in teams as part of a programme in October, where they attended a series of workshops led by Emmynominated director and producer Todd Thompson.

"This is the third edition of Project Documentaries and I've been involved in each of



the three and it's incredible to see the progression each year," Ambassador Steven told *GulfWeekly*.

"I'm pleased to see that this year, the subjects of the documentaries are just perfectly Bahraini themes. For someone like me, who is a foreigner, who has a great desire to learn about the kingdom, each time I watch these films, I feel better educated.

"We, at the embassy, are extremely grateful for the works that we do with the Youth Affairs Ministry. The minister (Rawan Tawfiqi) is a very strong supporter of this.

"But let's not forget what the key aspect of this is: It's to impart skills to Bahraini youth so that when they enter the labour force, they increase the capabilities of that sector. The film industry in Bahrain has a very bright future," he added.

Jassim Ahmed, 22, who won the award for Best Directing for *Hope from the Ashes*, said bringing the film alive comprised many challenges, including permissions, making it a learning experience.

"It's a great feeling to win this award but the bigger prize for me is the positive reaction of the viewers during the screening," the Bahrain University student majoring in Mass Communication said.

"It was a learning journey especially in consistency and organisation. I found that combining storytelling with an event that happened six months ago was hard. It was like a puzzle where we had to work around the pieces and create a compelling, hopeful, story," the Hidd resident explained.

Hope from the Ashes paints a vivid picture of the plight of shopowners and others who were affected by the Manama suq fire in June.

"It's a very sensitive topic and we had to do extensive research to get our facts right," Bahrain Polytechnic

student Maryam Abdulwahab, 22, who worked in various production roles and managed the research work for the film, noted

The other films – *Al Dana* documented Bahrain's pearling heritage and *Heroes Beyond the Track* glorified the Bahrain Marshals – volunteers who are entrusted with ensuring safety and managing motorsport events in the kingdom.


"It's been three months of intense efforts and a great

opportunity. There's so much that's already been said about Bahrain's sea and pearling tradition and so, the challenge for us was to tell the story in a unique way," Rashed Althuwaini, 24, *Al Dana* writer and media graduate from Bahrain University, said ahead of the screening.

# Elephant tale

AHRAINI author Nada Fardan has dropped her first children's book in English, which normalises making mistakes and learning from them in a supportive environment, offering valuable lessons to both children and parents.

Illustrated across 20 pages by UK-based Iranian artist Maliha Ahmadi, *One Trunk Away* is the heartwarming tale of Harry, a young elephant, and his mother, who gently encourages him to face new challenges on his own.

"It's a delightful read for children and a comforting reminder for parents about the importance of nurturing confidence and resilience in their little ones," the Sanad resident told *GulfWeekly*.

"One day, when Harry's C mother falls ill, he must dress himself without her direct help. Initially uncertain, Harry finds comfort in his mother's assurance that she is 'just one trunk away'.

"Through three relatable incidents, the story imparts valuable lessons about embracing independence, understanding that mistakes are part of learning and feeling reassured by a parent's unwavering support," she added.

The mother of one came across the phrase 'I'm just one phone call away', while watching television, which ignited the idea for the book.


"That simple yet powerful statement moved me and sparked the theme of my story: encouraging children's independence while reassuring them of parental support.

"I chose a family of elephants, to make it more relatable to young readers, and replaced the 'helping hand' with a 'helping trunk'. This story is targeted at children in higher kindergarten and first grade, and encourages them to embrace small steps towards independence while knowing their parents are always close by to guide them," she revealed.

The former architect, who took to writing as a full-time career a decade ago, has published 13 books so far, including *One Trunk Away*.

Initially, Nada was hesitant to write in English since it is her second language, but once she set the story concept, her confidence grew.

"Writing in Arabic feels natural and intuitive, while writing in English required a mindful approach, particularly in addressing cultural

distinctions embedded in the language,"

"What motivated me to take this step was a desire to reach a global audience of young readers. English, as a universally spoken language, provides an opportunity to connect with children from diverse backgrounds.

"Additionally, I have non-Arab friends who have long encouraged me to create

something their children can enjoy. Their unwavering support, even attending my book launches, inspired me to write this story as a gesture of gratitude," she noted.

Nada thanked popular Bahraini creatives – author Rasool Darweesh and English professor Zainab Al Laith – who helped her in the editing process. *One Trunk Away* was published by local house Al Ayam Publishing.

"One of the biggest challenges I faced was finding the right sponsor and publisher. Initially, I signed with an Egyptian publisher, but the process was fraught with delays and complications, particularly regarding the quality and design of the book. After much deliberation, I decided to collaborate with a Bahraini publisher. This change allowed

me to oversee the design process personally, ensuring that every detail met my standards," she explained.

Not one to rest on her past laurels, Nada is already working on her next story *The Source of Generosity*, which is set to be published next month, and will also venture into illustration with this project.

"The book was commissioned to me by the Sharjah Institute for Heritage to enrich children's literature for the Sharjah Heritage Days Festival (being staged in February). This will be my first experience bringing my own artistic vision to life, and I look forward to sharing it with my readers," she added.



### IVE-ACTION animated adventure comedy film *Paddington in Peru* is out now in theatres.

The film series, which is based on the stories by Michael Bond, takes viewers along on Paddington Brown's journey.

It starts with the spectacled bear being adopted by the Brown family who find him at Paddington railway station in London sitting on his suitcase with a note attached to his coat that reads 'Please look after this bear. Thank you'.

The latest instalment in the series follows the beloved bear's adventure as he heads

to the wilds of Peru, home of the spectacled bear species, alongside the Brown family looking for Aunt Lucy, who has gone missing from the Home for Retired Bears.

The gentle beast has become a popular and wellloved figure that is especially celebrated in the UK due to his friendly, charismatic and polite nature, and how he innocently finds himself in trouble.

He is also known for his old hat, battered suitcase, duffel coat and love for marmalade sandwiches, which Paddington's voice actor Ben Whishaw dislikes.

"Sadly, I don't like marmalade. It really doesn't agree with me at all," Ben revealed in an interview, adding that when the audience see Paddington eating on screen, the munching sound is coming from the actor eating bread or fruit.

Director Dougal Wilson revealed that he was 'terrified' of carrying on the series from Paul King, who directed the previous movies.

"I was approached by Rosie Alison (producer) and StudioCanal (production company) because they were interested in doing a third instalment of Paddington, but Paul King, who so brilliantly did the first two, wasn't available because he was off doing Wonka (2023).

"They needed someone new and they looked around, and for some reason thought I might be suitable. I thought, that's terrifying. Why on Earth would I want to attempt to make the most difficult instalment of something so brilliant? I'll inevitably mess it up. But I also thought, well, if I don't try, I'll probably regret it," he added.

The first two films were well-received by critics and audiences alike. The children's literature fictional character first appeared in 1958 in author Michael's book *A Bear Called Paddington*.

### FEAR FACTOR

EASON two of American supernatural horror television series *Goosebumps* releases tomorrow on *Disney+*.

**Based** on the children's namesake horror books by author R L Stine, Goosebumps: The Vanishing is set to follow different stories with different characters in each season, and mainly tackles adventures of teenagers or preteens who find themselves in frightening and supernatural circumstances.

The latest season of the anthology series follows teenage siblings Devin (Sam McCarthy) and Cece (Jayden Bartels) who discover a threat in their home that triggers a chain of events that unravels a profound mystery, resulting in the duo finding themselves entangled in the story of five teenagers who mysteriously vanished in 1994.

This season will also feature the *Friends* series star David Schwimmer, who will portray the siblings' single father.

"I've always been a fan of horror, a genuine fan. I love scary movies, I love



being scared at the movie theatre or at home," David said in an interview.

"So, I was just really excited, because the combination of horror, action and comedy is the sweet spot for me. I've always wanted to do it, and I thought this was going to be just a blast and it was," he added.

The Goosebumps book series was published throughout 1992 until 1997 and consists of 62 titles.

The *Disney+* show is the second TV adaptation of the written works, with the first one, which consisted of four seasons, aired between 1995 and 1998.

### THRILL OF BEING HUMAN

### Service COTTISH rock band Franz Ferdinand are releasing their sixth studio album *The Human Fear* tomorrow.

The album marks the artists' return to the scene since 2018, and is set to sonically represent the group in an authentic way as they stick to their signature sound while also experimenting with new elements.

In an interview, Frontman Alex Kapranos said, "I don't think there's a single song that you'll hear on the album and won't think, 'Oh, is that Franz Ferdinand?' At the same time, there will be thinking, 'Oh, did they really do that?' That's not to say I start rapping or anything like that."

The 11-track album will tackle the subject of fear, a theme that found its way naturally throughout the creative process.

"Making this record was one of the most life-affirming experiences I've had, but it's called *The Human Fear*. Fear reminds you that you're alive. I think we all are addicted in some way to the buzz it can give us. How we respond to it shows how we are human. So

here's a bunch of songs searching for the thrill of being human via fears," Alex added.

"The song *Hooked* (off the upcoming album) starts with the line 'I got a fear, got the human fear' and those were the last lyrics written for the album.

"When we finished recording and took a step back, we realised that was the theme. All the songs on the album are about fear in one way or another," he revealed.

Formed in 2002, the Grammy-nominated band's original lineup was composed of Alex (lead vocals, lead guitar, keyboards), Nick McCarthy (rhythm guitar, keyboards, vocals), Bob Hardy (bass guitar, percussion) and Paul Thomson (drums, percussion, backing vocals).

In 2017, Julian Corrie (keyboards, lead guitar, backing vocals) and Dino Bardot (rhythm guitar, backing vocals) joined the band after Nick left in the previous year to concentrate on his family and personal musical projects, and Audrey Tait (drums, percussion) joined after Paul left in 2021.

The Human Fear marks the ensemble's first studio album recorded with drummer Audrey.



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
