

AHRAIN'S culinary heritage is taking its seat amidst top cultural destinations at Canada's Pearson International Airport, as part of an ongoing exhibition celebrating diversity.

An iconic photo of a majlis on Lake Muskoka's deck, with fresh Bahraini food cooked by Bahraini-Canadian Chef Suman Ali was recently unveiled at Terminal 3 in the Pearson International Airport in Toronto, Canada.

It is part of a series of photographs taken as part of Take Your Seat, a photojournalism initiative by father-son team Randy and Spencer VanDerStarren.

"This shoot took place on a deck at Horseshoe Lake in the summer of 2023, where we wanted to highlight how food can be a conversation starter, and that Bahraini and Khaleeji cuisine is more than just machboos (spiced chicken and rice) and harees (a seasoned savoury porridge made of wheat or bulgur mixed with meat)," the 32-year-old award-winning chef and corporate culinary executive, who splits her time between Toronto, Canada and Sanad, told GulfWeekly.

"Khaleeji and Bahraini food have a range of influences, including those from the South Asian diaspora, who

of our history.

Take Your Seat has been exhibiting photographic installations in the high-traffic Toronto Pearson Airport since 2017 to humanise the airport experience, showcase worldclass destinations and connect travellers to a unifying mission.

Their image of Chef Suman's bountiful Bahrainthemed meal and majlis served on the deck at Terrawoods on Muskoka

Shores Cottage and Park Resort will make her the first Bahraini/ Khaleeji artist and chef to be featured at an international level in North America.

Alongside the image is a QR code, which will provide visitors with more information about

her cooking and Bahraini cuisine.

According to Chef Suman, the meal fused Bahraini cuisine with locally sourced ingredients, from deer and lamb kebabs – her specialty to skewers made from cedar and spruce, cooked over a fire pit, reminiscent of how food was cooked both in the desert and the North American wilderness.

Items on the menu ranged from Sabzi Ontario Harvest with heirloom carrots, wild mushrooms, sweet potato and saffron. to Bahraini Hummus with Daqoos (a garlicflavoured tomato sauce) and Zaatar (a culinary herb from the region).

"Having grown up in East Riffa, much of my inspiration comes from the multicultural spread at the sufra (table),

where we would have daal (lentils) and achaar (pickle), alongside traditional Bahraini dishes – so food was always a place where divides were bridged and walls broken down," Chef Suman added.

Alongside the reveal of the photo at the Avant-Garde Toronto Gallery, Chef Suman and her collaborators were also honoured by Toronto Ward 11 city councillor Dianne Saxe, for 'producing an incredible celebration of unity through art, culture and fellowship.'

The photograph is also expected to be included in Take Your Seat's second upcoming photo book, with more details to be announced closer to the release date.

In the coming months, Take Your Seat will be coming to Kuwait, and Chef Suman also hopes to have an event in Bahrain's desert, where the photography duo can capture the ambience of the kingdom.

Bowled over!



ORMER Bahrain resident and author Dr Debashish Sengupta's latest title, Stumped, has hit the shelves and documents the life of yesteryear cricketing sensation Syed Kirmani, both off the pitch and on it.

The book was officially unveiled in a star-studded event in Bengaluru, India, on December 29, the sportsman's 75th birthday, which was attended by several former Indian cricketers.

Dr Debashish, who lived in Bahrain with his family from 2019 to 2024, co-wrote the 272-page book with journalist Dakshesh Pathak from India.

Syed was a member of the Indian team that won the iconic 1983 Cricket World Cup. In 2016, he was awarded the Col C K Nayudu Lifetime Achievement Award, the highest honour bestowed by the Board of Control for Cricket in India on a former player.

"I started working on *Stumped* about eight years ago and it's been a wonderful journey getting to know the man behind the cricketer," Dr Debashish, who worked at Royal University for Women during his stay in Bahrain, told *GulfWeekly*.

An ardent fan of Syed since childhood, the 50-year-old creative was looking for a guest for the launch of his book *Life of Y* when a common friend of the two introduced him to Syed.


"I was 'bowled over' in our first meeting. When I went to thank him after the launch, he told me that he would like to release a biography and asked me if I would write it. I had never written biographies before but my work follows a narrative style so, I was confident and I decided to accept the project," the London-based associate professor and course leader at Portsmouth University noted.

"I suggested that he send me voice notes of stories from his childhood. I listened to them and made notes especially for factual information. I let it settle for a few days and then the words came to me."

This continued for five years, until one day, Dr Debashish got a call from Syed who said there was a journalist who might come

aboard the project.

"He could have just got him on board but he called me as I had been working on the book for the last five years," he said. "This shows the nature of the man. I accepted as Dakshesh was a brilliant addition to the team."

Stumped is divided into two sections – the biography, written by Dr Debashish, and a 'ringside view', penned by Dakshesh, who has been closely following the cricketer's career for a long time.

"We were wondering how to co-author as we had different writing styles – mine biographical and his journalistic. I then had the idea to split the book into two sections," he revealed.

"As the co-author of this

notable sportsman's story, I honestly met my worth as a writer and journalist," Dakshesh noted.

Stumped is peppered with lesser known facts about the sportsman, like he was a boxer before he got into cricket.

A poignant chapter entitled 'Best Loser' tells the story of how Kirmani lost a boxing match and was dubbed by one of the judges as the 'best loser' because he had a 'winning attitude', one that he is known to have carried with him all his life.

Also recording Syed's journey 'beyond the 22 yards', the book features many personal anecdotes.

"One day, as he was entering an event, he was greeted by many people including the security guard. Mr Kirmani stopped, put his hand on the guard's shoulder, and spoke to him before proceeding – a testament to his humility," Dr Debashish said.

"The biography features my emotional experiences and disappointments too," a candid Sayed revealed, adding that he hopes readers enjoy the book.

So far, Dr Debashish has written seven books, including *Stumped*. He is set for the 'second innings' of his previously released *Life of Z*, which offers a behavioural perspective of 'Gen Z'. *Life of Y*, a similar book about millennials, was re-released last month. All three have been published by Penguin Books.

The former Reef Island resident continues to visit Bahrain where his friends live and is known for his research paper on 'motivations of young women in Bahrain volunteering during Covid-19', which bagged the Best Research Project award for 2022-23 at the Global Higher Education Awards from among more than 20 entries. *Stumped* is available on *Amazon*.

Math master

AHRAIN-BASED math whiz Edwin George has bagged first place in the international Gama Abacus championship, for the second consecutive year, writes Melissa Nazareth.

The fourth-grade student, who attends the New Indian School, participated in the E3 category at the highly competitive event, which saw a participation of more than 2,500 students from across the world.

The 25th edition of the contest took place at the Thrissur Indoor Stadium in Kerala, India, on January 11. Participants included students from India, Sri Lanka and other Gulf countries like Bahrain and Qatar.

"Edwin exhibited arithmetic ability from a young age, which is why we decided to register him for abacus training," father Sibu George, who works as a business unit head in the medical equipment industry, told *GulfWeekly*.

"It was during the Covid-19 pandemic and there were limited physical classes, so we opted for online. Edwin has been training for more than three years now and we're so proud of how far he has come in such a short span of time.

"While his classes are conducted over the weekend, he solves worksheets and practices during the week, striking a balance with school work," he added.

Several studies show that abacus training enhances concentration and calculation skills in children. Some even say that the increased brain activity provides mental health benefits like reduced anxiety.

"When he was younger, Edwin used to write some numbers incorrectly like a mirror image, but since he took up abacus classes, he has been able to correct this issue thanks to the practice of speed writing numbers that the course includes," the Adliya resident, who has been living in Bahrain for the last 12 years with his wife and two sons, revealed.

The 10-year-old has also won several chess competitions, the latest being an online event where his chess academy collaborated with a non-government organisation (NGO) in Bengaluru, India.


"Edwin played against other children and adults from the NGO and won after about eight games," Sibu added.

Inspired by brother Johan, 13, who is musically inclined, Edwin has lately been exhibiting a keen interest in singing as well.

"Johan was presented the title of Kala Prathiba at the Kerala Catholic Association's Indian Talent Scan competition in 2023," Sibu said, adding that they have always encouraged their children to pursue their interests.

Sibu is a bio medical engineer by qualification and his wife Neetha is a certified microbiologist and former teacher at Al Noor International School – currently she is a homemaker.

The George family is busy preparing Edwin for an upcoming virtual abacus competition, set to take place next month.



Telling tales




K-BASED Saudi author Leena Al Nasser unveiled her book in Manama earlier this month and is now showcasing illustrations from it at an exhibition, shining a bright spotlight on 'imaginative thinking and creativity'.

The book, An Imaginary Place Called Home, which is a collection of visual narratives, was launched on January 9 at Al Riwaq Art Space, where the namesake art display will be open for viewing until February 9.





exhibition tackle several themes, with some taking inspiration from historical events such as the industrial revolution, and others being created from scratch.

"For our story entitled Colour, we had to create the characters, script and concept," Haider, 28, told GulfWeekly.

"I don't use references in my art, it's all imagination, which is why we think it's is a pure piece of creation," he added.

"Drawing from visual memory means that instead of looking at the picture or scene and drawing it, I go out and look at things, and then draw them in the way I can remember," he explained.










Haider's 'imaginative' style caught Leena's attention.


According to the art and culture consultant, who is currently pursuing a master's degree in fine arts at London's Goldsmiths University, the only way the two could communicate for the collaboration was through texts and voice notes because of the war in Syria.

Leena and Haider mailed back and forth all the artwork, which is explained in 'The Story of Minzlee', displayed at the exhibition.

Leena's book was first

unveiled in the United Kingdom in October 2023 and has now found its way to the Arab region with the launch at Al Riwaq earlier this month.

She chose Bahrain as she believes that Al Riwaq gallery is a 'nurturing place for art' and has been enamoured by its history since its establishment in 1998.

"Writing, for me, was a visual process," she said.

"The ideas came from me collecting scraps and little pieces of drawings from old books, and I started making up stories with the limited material and creating collages.

"At first, I was just playing, I had these hilarious, ridiculous stories mixed with history because I was reading a lot at the time as well, but then I realised that there was something to this, and that's when things started coming together."

While Leena's vision was

clear, Haider explained that they needed to 'dress them up', giving each story a different visual style, some more cartoonish and others more realistic.

"Everyone can enjoy the book - a child can open it and enjoy the story and visuals, and an adult can have a better understanding of the underlying meaning,' art educator Haider added.

Speaking of further mutual collaborations, Leena said she would love to transform one of her interactive artworks into an illustrated story with Haider.

Her installation entitled Her Majesty: Velvet Woman is designed as a pink tent that takes the shape of a veiled woman, luring visitors to enter and read her story.

"It's my passion to tell stories of women throughout history and to creatively display them," she added.

The book is available online and at Al Riwaq.



HE long-awaited second season of dystopian TV series Severance premieres tomorrow on Apple TV+, with weekly episodes releasing until March 21.

Starring *Parks and Recreation*'s Adam Scott, *Severance* follows a team
of employees at Lumon
Industries, a biotechnology
company founded by
highly respected doctor and
philosopher Kier Eagan.

The company is known for valuing work-life balance as all its newly-hired employees must go under a 'severance' procedure that surgically separates their work and personal memories, creating two versions of themselves referred to as 'innie' (in work) and 'outie' (out of work).

The procedure is ethically questioned by members of the public and eventually, raises concerns between its employees, escalating to Mark Scout (Adam) and his co-workers finding themselves on a mission to discover the true nature of their work and the consequences of the severance barrier.

The new season is set to carry on from season one's (2022) cliff-hanger finale that left fans at the edge of their seat, as the severed four main characters discover missing links between their two worlds.

Show creator Dan Erickson revealed that fans can expect the show to get even darker and more twisted.

"We very much wanted to put our heroes in a scarier place because season one ends with them poking

ANADIAN rapper Malcolm James
McCormick aka Mac Miller's new

"It is a project that was of great importance to Malcolm, to the extent that he commissioned artwork for it, and discussions concerning when it should be released were had regularly," it said.


The cover art features a portrait of the late rapper by painter Alim Smith.

Given that unofficial versions of the album have circulated online for years and that releasing *Balloonerism* was something that Malcolm frequently expressed being important to him, we felt it most appropriate to present an official version of the project to the world," the statement noted.

This is the second posthumous release following the artist's passing in 2018, *Circles* (2020) being the first, and overall, the seventh studio album in his discography.



NGELINA Jolie returns to the big screen as she stars in the biographical drama film *Maria*, out now in theatres.

Directed by Pablo Larraín and written by Steven Knight, it follows the seven days before opera singer Maria Callas's death in Paris in 1977. Callas reflects on the highs and lows of her life and career.

The movie is director Pablo's third instalment in his important 20th-century women trilogy, preceded by *Spencer* (2021) about Princess Diana and *Jackie* (2016) about Jacqueline Kennedy.

American-Greek soprano Maria was one of the most influential opera singers of her era, praised for her wide-ranging voice and singing techniques.

She spent her last years living mostly in isolation in the French capital, until she died of a heart attack at 53.

Angelina revealed that she had gone through seven months of training to sing opera for the film, which is a first in her career as she has not sung for a film role before.

"My first time singing I remember being so nervous, my sons were there and they helped lock the door so that nobody else was coming in and I was shaky," she said.

"Pablo, in his decency, started me in a small room and ended me in La Scala (a theatre in Paris where the filming took place) so he gave me time to grow," she added.

The actress explained that she deeply cared about honouring the opera singer's legacy and her fans, and it was a priority for her to do the icon justice.

Director Pablo expressed that, through the film, he wanted to celebrate the late artist's career and artistry rather than focusing on the low points of her life and the tragedy of her death.

"I didn't want to make a dark movie about a tragic situation, but rather about a woman who spent her life singing for others, taking care of others, worrying about her relationships, and now she's ready to take care of herself and find her own destiny." January 16-22, 2025 www.gulfweekly.com

► ERGIO 'Checo' Perez's downfall at Red Bull was swift, but it has not taken the Mexican star long to find peace as he considers his next career move.

Perez signed a two-year contract extension with Red Bull last June, but parted ways with the Formula 1 team just six months later following a poor second half of the 2024 season that saw him finish eighth in the driver's standings.

Perez wanted to keep his seat with Red Bull for a fifth season, but the team decided to sign 22-year-old Liam Lawson to pair with four-time world champion Max Verstappen. Perez reportedly was offered an ambassador-type role with the F1 team, but he opted to walk away from his contract.

Less than a month later, Perez said he is in a 'dream position' as he considers his next career

"I'm very happy with my life, very excited about what's ahead," he said at the Leon State Fair in Mexico, per Racer.

"For sure, if I receive a good, interesting (F1) project, then I'll definitely consider it and think about it. It will all come in its own time. For now, my priority in the months ahead is to have fun, do what I haven't been able to, travel, be with my family...

"In the next six months I'll make a decision on what I want **Sergio** for the next step of my career."

Red Bull team principal Christian Horner said at the time that it was Perez's decision to take a break from F1, but the driver said that was not the case.

"Everything happened very quickly at the end of the season, so I didn't expect it," said Perez, who turns 35 this month.

After pursuing his F1 dream since he was six years old and spending the past 14 years living it out, Perez said he is enjoying the increased freedom in his schedule. While the 20 F1 drivers are hard at work preparing for the 2025 season, which begins in mid-March with the Australian Grand Prix, Perez is spending time with family and friends.

"It's incredible, especially at this time of year when you're already thinking about the season and you can't do anything anymore," he said. "It's really cool because I've been doing this all my life.

"This is my first year since I can remember where I can decide what to do. It can be different plans, I can go (somewhere), I can confirm a trip, I can go with my family and my children wherever I want. So the truth is it's something that I'm enjoying a lot, and I'm really looking forward to what's coming this year."

Perez has recorded six wins and 39 podium finishes since making his F1 debut in 2011. His most recent victory came at the 2023 Azerbaijan Grand Prix.


"That's why we stick (with it). We're going to continue. It's what you brought," Wolff responded, according to the Formula 1 website.
